Attached you will find a list of finalists and winners for the 1984 Billboard Radio Awards Competition. This list represents the decision of the judges who are listed herewith. Responsibility for the final compilation was a part of my duties as radio editor.

As you are aware, I left that position on June 1, 1985 with the understanding that since the awards contest was conducted during my tenure that I would complete the tabulation process. On July 15, 1985 Adam White, then editor in chief, received the final selections as reflected herewith.

At that point Jonathan Hall was involved with the magazine. He contacted me to voice his disatisfaction with some of those selected. In short, he wanted to change some of the decisions to reflect what he felt would give Billboard a better presence. He went so far as to level nepotism charges at me and when it was apparant the example he cited was innacurate he then leveled charges about the competence of the judging panel. While I was able to be sympathetic with some of his concern over the choices in some categories due to an excessively low number of entries in those categories, the fact remained that there were only two ways for someone to be selected: he or she must have entered, or in those categories with few entries, he or she must have been nominated by all the judges for that category.

Once it became apparant that Hall infact would be changing the winners not in accordance with the above criteria, I issued a letter to Billboard's group publisher Jerry Hobbs explaining the situation. Shortly thereafter Jonathan began calling judges trying to coerce them into changing their opinions.

The end result unfortunately varied significantly from the list supplied herewith. Categories were added, categories were divided, and winners were altered. Of the changes, two were most significant.

1. Mike Harrison was denied his award completely. To briefly outline the events, Harrison entered the contest in late 1984. Entrees overall were extremely light for his category—major market AOR PD of the year. Three judges were selected for that category: Bob Cole—a country programmer of long standing and respect now doing adult contemporary at Austin's KOKE; Air personality Jack Armstrong, veteran of several formats including his current afternoon drive airshift on KKHR Los Angeles; and Barry Richards, longtime radio and television personality who programmed one of the first progressive rock stations in the country and more recently saw urban formatted WAIL in New Orleans top the ratings in 1982 and 1983.

All three judges independent of one another ranked Harrison's entry as tops. For some reason this was not to Jonathan's liking. It would be pure heresay to explain what his complaint was, but one fact remains: Judge Bob Cole received a lengthy call from Jonathan where he repeatedly tried to have Cole switch his vote to WBCN Boston's Oedipus. Cole held firm in his decision, saying among other things that Oedipus did not enter and was not nominated. Hall retorted to him, 'Oh, he was a late entry', a fact hardly true since the entry cut off is January 1 and Cole did not begin judging until mid spring. (His "entry" was never brought to my attention either prior to my final of Oedipus' Hall listed all submissions On July 15.) qualifications, and successes, and while no one can argue that he is a fine programmer, the fact remained that neither Cole, Armstrong nor Richards had nominated him, nor had he entered.

Jonathan ended the discussion with, 'Well am I to understand you'd feel a tie was a more acceptable compromise?' to which Cole replied, "Jonathan, that's the beginning of a compromise." When the awards were announced two weeks after that conversation, Cole was surprised to find no mention whatsoever about Mike Harrison, and a lone award going to Gedipus.

2. Randy Kabrich. Randy, a previous award winner entered for his work at Washington's WAVA. (In 1984 Randy spent 8 months at WAVA and the remainder of the year at Charlotte's WROQ). To his knowledge all was well until he received a call from a Billboard writer who wanted to interview him because he was nominated for WROQ. Randy was quite upset because he did not enter for WROQ nor did he wish to be judged by his work there in 1984. After questioning the writer about other potential winners he phoned me to see what was happening. I verified that some of the stations he supplied me were not entrants or winners and promised I would contact Billboard to see that he was not linked with WROQ in the competition.

In this category, two judges were involved (the third did not finish the judging process before final cutoff). One was KWEN Tulsa GM Lee Masters, the other United Broadcasting's national PD Jack Beach. (In an argument with Kabrich, Hall depicted Masters who has vast programming experience in addition to being a former station owner and an air personality in New York City as "some nobody from Tulsa". Of Beach whose duties include overseeing a group of stations which include San Francisco's number one music outlet, KSOL, Hall conteneded he was someone who hadn't seen the inside of a radio station.)

Masters was put on the panel by my predecessor Doug Hall and Beach asked for and earned that right by his track record. Both were among the most conscientious of judges. And not surprisingly both received calls at the last minute from Hall. After verifying their selections (both voted for KIMN Denver's Doug Erickson in first place with Randy Kabrich in a close enough race to have caused me to tie both individuals initially). Sonny Joe White, again a fine PD, was ranked in approximately sixth

place by both judges), Jonathan attempted to sway them in Sonny Joe White's favor. Both judges stood adamantly by their original choices.

When the awards were announced, several things occured. 1: The contemporary/AC category was split in two reflecting both top 40 (contemporary) and AC separately (a move I agree with as did the two judges, but this change is something which must occur BEFORE judging— it would have been an appropriate move for next year).

2. An additional market category was added. To the previous major, medium and small market delineations came a new "top 10 market" category— again, after the fact.

Accepting both those changes, the obvious choices in the contemporary category would have been Denver's Doug Erickson for Major Market and Washington's Randy Kabrich for Top 10. While questions could have arisen over my decision to tie these individuals, under a divided market situation they each were clear cut victors. What was finally decided though was that Sonny Joe White would win for Top Ten (regardless of the fact that neither judge thought him so suited) and Erickson would take the major market category. Kabrich became an "honorable mention" in the latter category into which Washington did not even fall.

A comparison between the list herewith and the published winners will turn up several other discrepencies as interested parties will note. I hesitated briefly before writing this letter as being a former Billboard editor, I did not want it to appear as if I had any ill will to bear. Let me assure you that I feel my relationship with Billboard is a good one. Those I worked closely with while at the magazine I remember with only fondness.

My purpose here is twofold. One, on behalf of the people who were either denied awards or given awards for categories they did not enter, I felt I had an obligation. The work that went into many of these entries was significant, and those judged winners by a panel of their peers should be so informed. The second reason though, is perhaps even more demanding of action.

In an industry where awards regularly are products of popularity contests and political ties— and success is often judged solely by rating points, the Billboard Radio Awards were distinct. Winners had the satisfaction of knowing that a group of their peers ranked them superior in a number of areas related solely to their job performance. In a word, the Billboard Radio Awards carried integrity. From the actions of Jonathan Hall however, it seems that the awards are now meant to position the magazine—instead of the winners.

There are several ways Billboard could and should reposition itself with regard to the radio industry. For three years I labored to do that and the support that all of you have shown me proves it was worth the effort. I shudder at the thought of being a part of the process that might tear those labors down, but I feel morally bound to answer the numerous requests I have

had for a list of the finalists (which were never announced), judges, and their selections of winners. After a great deal of deliberation I have come to the personal conclusion that it would serve little good to make a media spectacle of this unfortunate turn of events, but I must add, I will respect whatever actions anyone affected elects to take and will provide any additional information known to me that may be pertinent to any of you.

I am truly saddened on all counts to be writing this letter, and while I can not promise to deliver an industry wide competition to replace the Billboard Awards at this time, I do pledge to continue serving the radio industry in the future with the same type of honest, forthright and insightful information you have come to expect from me.
